
Dear Ms. Coombs:

Dear Selectmen:

As New Hampshire State Historic Preservation Officer, I am pleased to inform you that the Sanbornton Square Historic District was entered in the National Register of Historic Places on December 8, 1980. A copy of the official notice is enclosed for your records. A copy of the National Register nomination is on file and is available for your inspection at the New Hampshire State Historic Preservation Office, 6 Loudon Road, Concord, New Hampshire.

The National Register is the official Federal listing of significant heritage resources (buildings, structures, sites, districts and objects) worthy of preservation, but it does not impose any restriction or limitation on the use of private or non-Federal property, unless Federal funds or programs are directly involved. Registered resources are eligible to be considered for Federal matching grants-in-aid for protection, preservation, rehabilitation or reuse. National Register designation also provides for review by the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (a Federal agency) of potential effects which any Federally funded, assisted or licensed project might have on registered properties.

HUD Historic Preservation Loans are available to rehabilitate Register properties for residential use. In addition, Section 2124 of the Tax Reform Act of 1976 (PL 94-455) contains Federal tax incentives for rehabilitation of privately-owned income-producing Registered properties; it discourages destruction of historic buildings by reducing tax incentives both for demolition of such structures, and for new construction on the site of demolished historic buildings. The Tax Reform Act also provides tax benefits for donation of easements and other gifts of real property for conservation, preservation, recreation, and education purposes, thus encouraging the protection of archaeological sites and natural settings as well as significant structures and districts.
